CALL TO ORDER

Chairman Wesson welcomed all of those present and thanked them for their attendance.

INVOCATION/PLEDGE OF ALLEGIANCE

Commissioner White led the Invocation and Pledge of Allegiance.

PUBLIC COMMENTS

There were no public comments at this time.

APPOINTMENTS

NC Forest Service Report by NCFS Bertie County Ranger, Mike Hoggard

Mike Hoggard of the NC Forest Service came forward to present a PowerPoint slideshow regarding the latest outbreak of forest tent caterpillars in the County.

Mr. Hoggard stated that these particular outbreaks occur every 5-20 years and usually do not require preventative treatment. Most outbreaks are controlled by natural factors including seasonal and ecosystem changes.

He stated that these caterpillars should not be confused with other tent caterpillars because they do not form silky webbed clusters in trees, and instead, they leave silky spots on the trunks of trees.

Additionally, Mr. Hoggard showed various aerial photos of the various clusters of woodlands where these caterpillars have left evidence of tree defoliation. He assured that the trees have simply been defoliated for the season, and that the caterpillars do not typically kill trees unless there's already a present vulnerability.

This item was strictly informational and no action was needed.

Republic Services County convenience site transition update by Josephine Aiken

Josephine Aiken of Republic Services was present to discuss the latest updates regarding the transitional process taking place for the County's convenience sites.

She stated that the transition is going well and that Republic Services has ordered all needed equipment, purchased all existing convenience site properties from Waste Industries, as well as completing the hiring process for all existing site attendants.

Ms. Aiken stated that Republic Services is excited about this opportunity and that they are doing all that they can to secure the existing site attendants as employees.

She announced that on Tuesday, June 2, 2015, Republic Services would be hosting an event to assist the existing site attendants with their online application process at the Chamber of Commerce in Windsor.

The Board thanked Ms. Aiken for the update, and requested reassurance that all existing site attendants be given various opportunities to apply for the new positions with Republic Services

Ms. Aiken stated that all site attendants have been contacted via phone, as well as been visited at each site to receive "how to apply" materials so that everyone is aware and familiar with the application process.

The Board thanked Ms. Aiken for her update and for her efforts in securing as many Bertie residents as possible in these new positions.

Mr. Roberson stated that he had been in contact with both the DSS and the Council on Aging Directors regarding the transfer of funds in the amount of \$5,926. The sum would be transferred from the ROAP Transportation line item under the Council on Aging Department, and would be transferred to the Department of Social Services

DISCUSSION AGENDA

Business Personal Property Tax update regarding taxpayer appeals and a review of the applicable General Statutes by County Attorney, Lloyd Smith

County Attorney Smith updated the Board on his latest findings regarding business personal property taxes and the pending appeal process.

County Attorney Smith directed the Board to various NC General Statutes including 105-312(k) Power to Compromise states that, "after a tax receipt [is] computed and prepared as required...the board of county commissioners, upon the petition of the taxpayer, may compromise, settle, or adjust the county's claim for taxes arising therefrom."

NCGS 105-308 states "any person whose duty it is to list any property who willfully fails or refuses to list the same within the time prescribed by law shall be guilty of a Class 2 misdemeanor. The failure to list is shall be prima facie evidence that the failure was willful."

NCGS 105-312 (f) states "When property is discovered and listed to a taxpayer in any year, it shall be presumed that it should have been listed by the same taxpayer for the preceding five years unless the taxpayer shall produce satisfactory evidence that the property was not in existence, that it was actually listed for taxation, or that is was not his duty to list the property during those years...."

NCGS 105-348 states "All persons who have or who may acquire any interest in any real or personal property that may be or may become subject to a lien for taxes are hereby charged with notice that such property is or should be listed for taxation....." The statute continues by clarifying that "this notice shall be conclusively presumed, whether or not such persons have actual notice." In other words, ignorance of the law is not an allowable defense.

Mr. Smith stated that the Board did have the power to compromise on various debts owed by citizens to the County, but that there are currently no guidelines set forth in the State statutes.

County Attorney Smith shared his review of leading NC property tax scholar William Campbell's article entitled, "Compromised Taxes on Discovered Property, An Unconstitutional Statute?", and it was Mr. Smith's conclusion that to proceed with compromising on these taxes would be unconstitutional and deprive honest taxpayers of their due process protection under the Constitution.

County Attorney Smith then presented his concerns from a legal standpoint regarding such practice and cautioned that under the law, it is a crime to not list taxes, and that it would present a disadvantage to those citizens who paid their outstanding taxes without complaint.

Lastly, County Attorney Smith stated that the Board could move forward if they desired, but that he strongly urged the County to draft strict rules regarding their power to compromise.

Chairman Wesson thanked Mr. Smith for his evaluation and stated that he did not believe it would be the wisest decision to pursue this matter further as Commissioners could be held individually liable in a court of law.

The Board concurred.

Consider joint meeting with Board of Education to review S&ME consultant report and discuss budget the next fiscal year

Chairman Wesson stated that the consultant report had been received from S&ME and that the Board should consider a joint meeting with the Board of Education to discuss the report, as well as other budget matters for next fiscal year.

One of the possible dates to be considered is June 15th beginning at 1:00PM just before the Board's regularly scheduled meeting Public Hearing on the proposed budget.

COMMISSIONERS' REPORTS

Commissioner Trent reported that a bucket truck had been secured by the Maintenance Department.

Commissioner Bazemore asked that the Board revisit the topic of Closed Session minutes and their placement on the County website. She also spoke about the response to the newly instated NACo Prescription, Health, and Dental Discount program, as well as her time with Vice Chairman Lee in Pitt County recently to hear Governor Pat McCrory speak about the \$30.0 billion bond financing package.

Discussion ensued, and all Commissioners agreed that transparency was important, and that no one was against Closed Session minutes being viewed by the public upon request.

Vice Chairman Lee reminded the Board that she had made the motion at the Board's meeting on Monday, May 18, 2015 to have Closed Session minutes online, and stated that she stood by her motion.

County Attorney Smith stated that the Board has the authority to decide how and where their minutes are accessed, and that all minutes are evaluated by the Clerk to the Board, County Manager, and the County Attorney's office.

Mr. Smith stated that Closed Session minutes could not be released unless the purpose of the Closed Session has been fully frustrated with the exception of some items including Personnel items which could not ever be made public.

After further discussion, Commissioner Bazemore made a **MOTION** to overturn the motion made by Vice Chairman Lee on Monday, May 18, 2015, but to continue to allow citizens to visit the County Offices to request Closed Session minutes that have been fully frustrated. Commissioner Trent **SECOND** the motion. The **MOTION PASSED** 4-1 with all Commissioners voting affirmatively except Vice Chairman Lee.

Commissioner White thanked Commissioner Bazemore for bringing forth the idea for the County to participate in the NACo Prescription, Health, and Dental Discount program as he had heard positive things from citizens in his area.

He also reported on a recent vote that was taken on House Bill 640, also known as The Outdoor Heritage Act (allowing Sunday hunting) which passed with a 33-13 vote. Senator Smith-Ingram has requested that all of the counties within her district to consider submitting an appeal of this latest measure. Mr. White stated that he hoped the Board would consider this matter more carefully. He requested that this item be reviewed at their next meeting, and also suggested a public hearing to receive citizen feedback.

Vice Chairman Lee congratulated the Council on Aging staff for hosting the recent Senior Fest at the Cashie Convention Center.

Chairman Wesson discussed his efforts in educating the public about Governor McCrory's attempts at passing the latest bond referendum as mentioned by Commissioner Bazemore. He encouraged the Commissioners as well as members of the public to visit the document online and provide him with feedback that can then forwarded to the Governor's office as the proposal does feature some positive improvements to Eastern North Carolina.

Additionally, Mr. Wesson informed all of those present that he had recently learned that Bertie County is currently operating under three different grants regarding early childhood development as it relates to literacy, parental involvement, and parental literacy.

He stated that only 40% of children who begin school in Bertie County have had any type of prior formal education including pre-school, Head Start, and others. He also mentioned that after having various discussions with local teachers that this hinders student achievement, and therefore produces lower test scores in the County later into elementary schooling.

He reported that the school system is seeking additional assistance from the County on how to identify children more effectively so that they are given the chance to participate in early learning opportunities.

COUNTY MANAGER'S REPORTS

County Manager Sauer approached the Board to give his FY 2015-2016 proposed budget plan.

Copies of this budget were submitted to the Board as well as to the public present.

Additional copies can be obtained through the County's website at http://co.bertie.nc.us, or at the office of the Clerk to the Board located at 106 Dundee Street, Windsor, NC 27983.

County Manager Sauer requested that the following message be placed into the record:

Chairman Wesson, Vice Chairman Lee, Commissioner Bazemore, Commissioner Trent and Commissioner White:

It is my obligation to present the proposed FY 2015-2016 budget plan for your consideration in an attempt to meet your goals, the needs of our citizens, and using the County's resources in a prudent manner.

This proposed budget is balanced without raising property taxes, and includes a conservative and measured use of available fund balance reserves.

Your County agencies and department heads have contributed significantly toward development of this fiscal plan, and I am especially grateful and indebted to the fiscal acumen of our Finance Officer William Roberson.

With every budget cycle certain requests are not recommended for funding, and to have proposed financial support for all of this year's budget requests would require a tax increase of sixteen (16) cents.

Every citizen should respect the difficult decisions that lay before the governing body, and I hope they will also respect the dedicated employees at every level in the organization who are committed to providing the best service possible.

As I further describe the items outlined in the following presentation, I hope that you will keep in mind that we are truly blessed and fortunate that the Board of Commissioners nearly a quarter century ago, took the bold step to consider hosting a regional landfill in Bertie County. Host fee revenues of \$1.6 million will keep thirteen (13) cents off of our tax rate for next fiscal year.

This Board also has the opportunity to continue this legacy as you consider additional efforts to:

• Extend the highest level of pre-hospital paramedic service on a 24/7 basis, giving our citizens a lifesaving and fighting chance with emergency care when our expansive geography is working against them in terms of proximity to a hospital.

- Address critical infrastructure and deferred facility maintenance concerns such as the courthouse and regional jail.
- Focus on economic development strategies and build on the recent selection of a marketing firm to promote Bertie County's four business clusters.
- Strengthen the County's regional water system with infrastructure improvements, consolidation of municipal systems and seeking financing for technology and system management enhancements.
- Build on the successful partnership with the Board of Education and both community colleges for workforce training (EMS Cadet program for example) and the Community-based recreation with the YMCA and our Recreation staff. Continue the dialogue regarding strategies to identify and serve the youth who are most at risk in our community.
- Invest in "Human Capital" and recognize the value of County staff, by taking steps to provide a working wage, retain talented department managers and plan for the succession and next generation of employees. And continue this work by engaging a compensation and classification study for all county staff in the next fiscal year.
- Continued support for the non-profit agencies in our community who reach the underserved populations or play a unique role in defining Bertie County as a special place to visit, invest, live, work and raise a family.

Lastly, County Manager Sauer proposed that the Board host its required public hearing for the budget as a part of its regular meeting on Monday, June 15, 2015.

Commissioner Trent made a **MOTION** to host the required public hearing for the proposed FY 2015-2016 budget during its regular meeting on Monday, June 15, 2015. Commissioner White **SECONDED** the motion. The **MOTION PASSED** unanimously.

The public hearing will also be advertised in both the Roanoke-Chowan News Herald and the Bertie-Ledger Advance.

Chairman Wesson stated that he was looking forward to this meeting, and that he was proud to see both Boards together to discuss very important topics for the County. He stated that he appreciated the positive working relationship, and looked forward to continuing that today.

Board of Education, Vice Chairman Oceana, concurred, and stated that his Board was also looking forward to working together at this meeting.

All members and staff present introduced themselves to the group before moving on to the business of the day.

BERTIE HIGH SCHOOL REPORT - MR. SCOTT HANCOCK, P.E., S&ME

Both Boards received a report from Mr. Scott Hancock, P.E. of S&ME. His firm performed a study at the new Bertie High School based on various concerns raised by the Commissioners regarding the structural integrity of the building.

Mr. Hancock presented his report and answered questions as necessary from both Board.

In addition, the Boards were shown various images displaying the flaws in the building upon the completion of construction including cracks in the walls and flooring, but it was made clear that these flaws presented no safety risk to the staff and students currently utilizing the building.

It was agreed that the report submitted by Mr. Hancock should also be shared with the architect, WIMCO, as well as with the contractor, Hite Associates. A plan of action would also be put into place to make the needed repairs.

MARTIN COMMUNITY COLLEGE PRESENTATION – WELDING PROGRAM INTIATIVE

Norman Cherry, Interim Director of the Martin Community College – Bertie Campus, and Dr. Ann Britt, President of Martin Community College, were present for this portion of the meeting.

Both were present to "plant the seed" for a welding program for Martin Community College. Dr. Britt and Mr. Cherry stated that this was simply to gauge interest, as well as to illicit possible funding opportunities via the school system, County, or through available grant funds.

Mr. Cherry also proposed his desire for the program to occupy some space within the old Bertie High School building, and that the majority of teaching and equipment costs could be covered by Martin Community College.

Both Boards concurred that this program was worthy of funding, but suggested that Mr. Cherry reach out to various employers including NUCOR to see if a partnership was possible to assist in sponsoring the program.

The Boards also requested that Mr. Cherry and Dr. Britt come forward again at a later date with specific figures regarding cost.

BOARD OF EDUCATION – OVERVIEW OF CAMPUS RENOVATION

Both Boards participated in a tour of the various areas recently renovated by members of the Board of Education's Maintenance Department. The renovations featured a new Board Room, a new conference room, and administrative offices, and is now also home to various non-profit organizations. The old Bertie High School is also the home of the new EMT Cadet program offered by Roanoke-Chowan Community College.

<u>BUDGET DISCUSSIONS – SCHOOL CURRENT EXPENSE AND CAPITAL OUTLAY</u> <u>FOR FY 2015-2016</u>

Chairman Wesson stated that he would like the following discussions to provide as much clarity as possible, and he was hopeful that the discussions would remain positive.

The Board of Education agreed, and discussion ensued regarding the County's proposed budget.

After a lengthy discussion, it was requested that the Board of Education provide additional details via a spreadsheet that would specifically break down the purpose of the funds requested in excess of the budget requested in FY 2014-2015.

The Board of Education was also encouraged to attend the County's public hearing for the budget at their next regular meeting on Monday, June 15, 2015.

RECESS OF THE BERTIE COUNTY BOARD OF COMMISSIONERS

Chairman Wesson recessed the Bertie County Board of Commissioners until Tuesday, June 9, 2015 at 5:00pm. The Board will continue their discussions regarding the Board of Education's requested budget inside the Commissioners Room located at 106 Dundee Street, Windsor.

The Bertie County Board of Commissioners recessed its regular meeting on Monday, June 1, 2015 in order to meet jointly with the Bertie County Board of Education inside the old Bertie High School, as well as to host a budget work session in Windsor today at 5:00PM. The following members were present or absent:

There were no media members present.

RECONVENE OF THE BERTIE COUNTY BOARD OF COMMISSIONERS

Chairman Wesson reconvened the meeting which was recessed on June 8th, a continuation of the Board's regular meeting from Monday, June 1, 2015.

Ms. Laree Cherry presented the JCPC program's County Plan for 2015-2016, and reviewed the funding proposal for next fiscal year. Three programs will be offered: MHFC Vocational and Educational, Children Matters, and Second Chance Counts. The total funding including state grants is \$99,471 and a local match equal to last year's funding of \$8,718 is requested.

Commissioner Bazemore made a **MOTION** to approve the County Plan. Vice Chairman Lee **SECONDED** the motion. The **MOTION PASSED** unanimously.

Commissioner Trent made a **MOTION** to approve the funding request as presented. Commissioner Bazemore **SECONDED** the motion. The **MOTION PASSED** unanimously.

County Manager Sauer referred the Board to two items at their desk.

First was the auditor's request for completion of the annual questionnaire requiring each Commissioner's signature.

Second was a copy of NCGS 115C-38 as requested by the Chairman regarding board member compensation for the Board of Education.

Chairman Wesson noted that the public hearing for the budget is next Monday, June 15, 2015 and suggested that the Commissioners agree on the format and rules of procedure for the hearing.

Specifically, it was discussed and agreed upon that each citizen wishing to speak would sign up on the speaker's sheet at the beginning of the meeting, and each speaker will be allowed 3 minutes for comments on the proposed budget.

It was also noted that if the attendance is large, provisions will be made to relocate the hearing to the large courtroom on the second floor of the courthouse.

Chairman Wesson asked the County Manager to review his analysis and recommendations relative to the Board of Education's request for additional current expense and capital outlay funding for next year.

Mr. Sauer noted that the proposed budget included \$2,503,000 for current expense and \$250,000 for capital outlay and that these recommendations were predicated on not increasing the tax rate and avoiding additional appropriation of fund balance reserves.

Mr. Sauer reviewed the County's debt service requirements for school financing and the calculated use of capital reserve funds to meet these annual obligations.

Sauer's presentation included a review of estimated revenues and projections for both FY 2015-2016 and FY 2016-2017 cautioning that it is impossible to accurately predict the future.

Specifically, the County Manager noted the conservative use of the federal subsidy monies for the Qualified School Construction Bonds, provided through federal stimulus funding to finance the new high school. Each year, this federal payment of approximately \$700,000 is subject to Congressional approval and has been negatively impacted by the past two sequestration cycles in Congress.

The County Manager explained that he and the Finance Officer, Mr. Roberson, have estimated that the Board has limited flexibility to increase school funding and that its sustainability for the future will be difficult to predict.

There was much discussion amongst the Commissioners regarding the declining student enrollment, the desire to work with the Board of Education in order to retain high quality teachers, and the willingness to find a compromise on the funding issue.

There was also discussion about the increasing operating expenses due to the addition of the new high school, the continued use of the former high school campus, and the fiscal burden of maintaining the current number of campuses across the County.

It was the consensus of the Board to have the Manager and Finance Officer incorporate an additional \$500,000 for current expense and an additional \$15,000 for capital outlay for FY 2015-2016.

This adjustment was noted in recognition of the school board's effort in the past two years to utilize its own fund balance to cover annual operating expenses as suggested by the Board of Commissioners.

There was also Board discussion and suggestions from the Commissioners regarding program initiatives being developed by both community colleges that may include welding, dental hygiene, law enforcement and corrections, and other programs requiring local support in the future.

The Board also discussed the County appropriations to non-profit agencies and community partners, and the need for more information regarding programs and the number of lives impacted in Bertie County.

Commissioners then discussed the proposed salary increases for non-public safety employees, and the two percent contribution for establishment of a 401k supplemental program for non-law enforcement employees.

The County Manager also responded to questions regarding the position reclassifications, staff promotions, and recommendations to improve the "working wage" for maintenance, custodial, and water department workers in the proposed budget. There was much discussion regarding the need to advance these efforts, conduct further study, and plan for another cycle of compensation recommendations next year, and to continue to recognize the value of the County's staff in meeting the Board's priorities.

Chairman Wesson encouraged each Commissioner to consider how the Board can improve its communications with the public, to "get our message out" to citizens regarding the County's priorities, its accomplishments and the work on future projects to improve our infrastructure, preserve the courthouse and expand the economic development efforts in our County.

It was noted that the Board has taken steps to support our employees with the establishment of the employee assistance program beginning July 1, 2015, plus the \$200 contribution for each staff member into a health savings account to assist with medical co-payments and pharmacy costs.

Commissioners also discussed the positive feedback from the public regarding the NACo prescription, health, and dental program recently initiated at the urging of Commissioner Bazemore.

One citizen was in attendance, former Commissioner Patricia Ferguson, who requested an opportunity to address the Board.

Ms. Ferguson indicated that she will be advocating for anti-poverty programs at the public hearing next week.

She complimented the Commissioners regarding their discussion, debate, and willingness to face difficult issues.

Ms. Ferguson encouraged the Board to continue to work toward "getting your message out" to the communities regarding priorities, the direction the County is heading and focusing on community and economic development.

Ms. Ferguson said she was also very pleased to see the Board's support for the school system.

There was no further discussion.

ADJOURN

Chairman Wesson adjourned the meeting at 7:15PM.

Each County will have at least one private-sector representative, the group of which representatives shall reflect the industrial and demographic composition of the workforce investment area. Economic development agencies, Employment Security Commission, educational (public schools), educational (community colleges), organized labor, rehabilitation agencies, community based organizations, and social service directors shall also be represented on the WDB.

Recommended Language

B. The WDB shall consist of nineteen (19) members with two (2) business representatives being initially appointed-by the "chief elected official" of each of the Counties. Fifty-one percent (51%) of the membership of the Workforce Development Board shall be comprised of representatives of business in the local area, as such phrase is defined in Section 107(b)(2)(A) of the WIOA. One-third of the WDB membership must be representatives of small business, female and minorities. At a minimum, two business members must represent small business as defined by the U.S. Small Business Administration. Each business representative must meet the following criteria: (1) Be an owner, chief executive officer, or other individual with optimum policymaking or hiring authority; (2) provide employment opportunities in demand industry sectors or occupations, as those terms are defined in WIOA Section (3(23); and provide high-quality, work-relevant training and development opportunities to its workforce or the workforce of others (in the case of organizations representing business as per WIOA Section 107 (b)(2)(A)(ii); and are appointed by the Counties from among individuals nominated by local business organizations and business trade associations. The Chief elected Officials of the Consortium will appoint WDB members from following groups representing the region: Economic development agencies (1), Division of Workforce Solutions (1). Adult Education and Literacy (1), Higher Education (1), (Labor; Apprenticeship; community-based organizations) (4), and the Vocational Rehabilitation agency.

RESOLUTION APPROVING ARTICLES OF ASSOCIATION AND AGREEMENT FOR REGION Q WORKFORCE INVESTMENT CONSORTIUM

WHEREAS, the counties of Beaufort, Bertie, Hertford, Martin, and Pitt, being independent and contiguous units of local county government, wish to agree to establish a workforce investment consortium ("Consortium") to act jointly as a Local Area ("LA") under the Workforce Innovation and Opportunity Act ("WIOA") Public Law 113-128 as authorized by North Carolina General Statutes, Section 160A-460, et seq.; and

WHEREAS, in addition to specific authority to enter into the agreement attached hereto, a "Chief Elected Official" for Workforce Innovation and Opportunity Act (WIOA) purposes upon whose representations the State of North Carolina, the Region Q Workforce Development Board (synonymous with Workforce Investment Board, the Mid-East Commission (As Local Area Administrative Entity) and the other counties may rely, must be designated and authorized to execute the attached agreement and such other agreements as are necessary for purposes of WIOA and who shall sit on the Consortium Board.

AGREEMENT FOR TRANSPORTATION SERVICES

This agreement, made and entered into by and between Choanoke Public Transportation Authority, hereafter called Provider; and <u>THE COUNTY OF</u> <u>BERTIE</u>, hereafter called Contractor;

WITNESSETH:

WHEREAS, the Provider is a body corporate and politic created by the joint resolution of the Boards of Commissioners of the counties of Bertie, Halifax, Hertford and Northampton, North Carolina, for the purpose of meeting the Public Transportation needs in the four-county area; and

WHEREAS, the Contractor is desirous of the transportation services provided by the Provider; and

WHEREAS, the Provider and the Contractor have negotiated the terms of understanding whereby the Provider agrees to provide the needed transportation services to the Contractor upon the compensation basis set forth below; and

WHEREAS, the Provider and the Contractor acknowledge that it is in the best interests of each that they make and enter into this agreement.

NOW, THEREFORE, in consideration of the premises and in further consideration of the terms and provisions set forth below, the receipt and sufficiency of which is hereby respectively acknowledged, the Provider and the Contractor agree as follows:

1. <u>PERIOD.</u> The period of performance of this agreement shall begin on <u>JULY 1, 2015</u> and shall terminate automatically on <u>JUNE 30, 2016.</u>

2. PROVIDER'S RESPONSIBILITIES.

- A. Provide transportation services for Older Americans 60 years of age and older who reside in Bertie County, to the Nutrition Sites in Aulander, Windsor, and Colerain and to other destinations as specified by the County.
- B. Notify the Contractor immediately of emergencies that may interrupt the transportation schedule.

- C. The Provider reserves the right to refuse transportation of a Contractor's client when it has been determined by the Provider that to do so would endanger the driver and other passengers being transported.
- D. The Provider's liability shall end when passengers leave the Provider's vehicles. At no time shall employees of the Provider's enter the Contractors premises escorting the Contractor's clients.
- E. Maximize it's efforts to deliver Older Americans to the Aulander, Windsor, and Colerain Nutrition Sites at 10:30 a.m.
- F. Call the Nutrition Site no later than 11:00 a.m. if there will be a delay in delivering the participants on time. The Provider further agrees that if the participants are not delivered by 12 noon and no telephone call is received by the sire, that day's charges for that bus will be canceled.
- G. Have the participants sign in when they board the bus and to give the above mentioned signature sheet to the site manager.
- H. Provide special trips for the Contractor within the Provider's limitation. All trips must be requested at least one week prior to delivery date.
- I. Notify the Contractor immediately of any condition that affects the transportation schedule. When conditions, such as ice and snow occur, the provider will make announcements through local radio stations concerning the transportation schedule.

3. CONTRACTOR'S RESPONSIBILITIES.

- A. To fax names, addresses, destinations and changes in schedules to the Provider by 10:00 a.m. the day before transportation is to be provided.
- B. The Contractor will notify the Provider of any cancellations by 4:00 p.m. on the day before. Failure to meet this deadline will result in the Contractor being charged with one-way trips.

- C. Notify the Provider concerning holidays or closings at least one week in advance. Except in cases of emergencies the Provider shall be notified as soon as possible.
- D. Provide emergency information on all agency clients scheduled for transportation. Such information shall include: parent or guardian's name and address, phone number, family physician and any special medical and/or physical conditions or special needs. Such information shall be kept in strict confidence by the Provider.
- E. The Contractor shall be responsible for escorting passengers needing assistance to and from the Provider's vehicles. In addition, the Contractor shall be responsible for arranging for caretakers once the Provider returns their clients to the final destination.
- F. To reimburse the Provider at a rate of <u>\$19.80</u> per round trip or <u>\$9.90</u> per unit of service in the agreement by the 25th day of the month.
- G. The Contractor will supply any special equipment needed by its clients.
- H. The Contractor will provide chaperones or escorts for any of its clients needing such services while such clients are being transported by the Provider.
- Notify the Provider of any special trip needs at least one week in advance.

5. <u>COMPENSATION.</u> The Contractor agrees to pay the Provider for its transportation services, upon invoice, at the following rates and terms:

\$9.90 per unit of service (Unit of Service meaning one-way trip) Agency will be charged for a one-way trip for no shows, unless cancellation is made by 4:00 p.m. on the day before services are scheduled to be provided.

 $1\frac{1}{2}$ % service charge will be added for all past due accounts beyond 60 days.

Checks shall be made payable to: Choanoke Public Transportation Authority.

- 6. <u>RATE INCREASES</u>. Rate increases will be based on several factors such as the cost of fuel, operating expenses, local support, etc. The provider will notify the contractor immediately of any rate increase. All increases shall take affect within ten (10) days of such notification.
- 7. **RELATIONSHIP.** The Provider is an independent contractor and no employee-employer or agency relationship exists between the Provider and the Contractor. Drivers and other employees of the Provider are not subject to the control or supervision of the Contractor.
- 8. <u>INDEMNITY.</u> To the extent of its liability insurance coverage, the Provider agrees to indemnity the Contractor of and from any and all personal injury and property damage claims which may result from the Provider's operation of its motor vehicles. The Provider shall provide the contractor proof of insurance upon request.

- 9. SAFETY POLICIES. To ensure the safe transportation of passengers, the motor vehicles of the Provider shall be operated in a careful and prudent manner and in compliance with the motor vehicle and highways laws of the State of North Carolina. Each driver shall hold a current North Carolina Drivers License issued by the Division of Motor Vehicles. The Provider maintains a statement of safety policies for the protection of its passengers and drivers, a copy of which has been provided to the Contractor, and the Contractor agrees to use its best efforts to encourage passengers to honor these policies.
- 10. <u>EARLY TERMINATION</u>. This agreement may be terminated at anytime with the mutual consent of the Provider and the Contractor, and it may be terminated unilaterally by either party upon thirty (30) days written notice to the other.
- 11. <u>AMENDMENTS.</u> This agreement may be amended or modified anytime with the mutual consent of the Provider and the Contractor. Amendments shall be in writing and in an instrument or equal dignity with this agreement.
- 12. COMMUNICATIONS. The mailing address of the Provider is CHOANOKE PUBLIC TRANSPORTATION AUTHORITY, PO BOX 320, RICH SQUARE, NC 27869 and its telephone number is (252) 539-2022. The contact person is PAMELA PERRY, EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR. The mailing address of the Contractor is 103 WEST SCHOOL STREET WINDSOR, NC 27983 and its telephone number is (252) 794-5315. The contact person for the Contractor is Venita Thompson.
- 13. <u>INTERPRETATION.</u> This agreement shall be interpreted in accordance with the laws of the State of North Carolina.
- 14. <u>CAPTIONS</u>. The captions in this agreement are for convenience only, and they shall not be interpreted to diminish or amplify the terms hereof.
- 15. <u>ENTIRE AGREEMENT</u>. These terms of this agreement constitute the entire agreement between the Provider and the Contractor, and there are no contemporaneous oral agreements contrary hereto.

IN WITNESS WHEREOF, the Provider, by its Executive Director and by Authority duly given by its Board of Directors, and the Contractor, by its Board and by Authority duly given, hereby execute this agreement in duplicate originals, one of which is retained by each, this the <u>20th</u> day of <u>March 2015</u>.

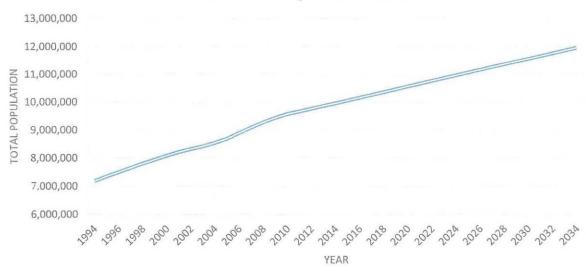

- North Carolina will not do anything to jeopardize our Triple A credit ratings by all three ratings agencies – the bonds have been sized to be well within current debt affordability, as recently determined by the State Treasurer.
- The state's pristine "Triple Triple A" credit rating keeps the cost of financing projects low.

 Interest rates are lower for public financing than they have ever been previously; if we are ever going to issue debt, now is the time.

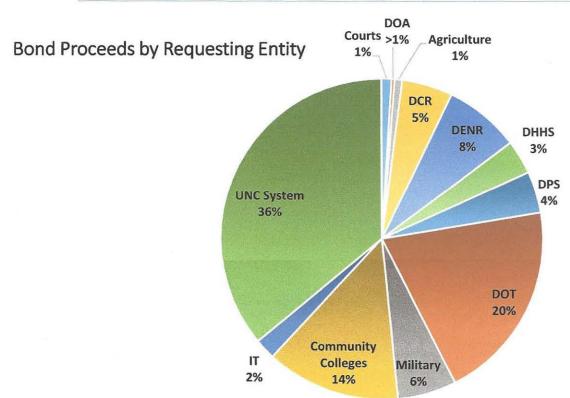
Interest Rates on Government Bonds at Historic Lows

In Raleigh...

On Thursday May 28th, House Bill 640 - The Outdoor Heritage Act, a bill allowing Sunday hunting with firearms passed in the Senate with a vote of 33-13. Senator Erica Smith-Ingram introduced an amendment at the request of seven of eight counties in her district. These counties desire the ability to decide whether or not to allow Sunday hunting on a local level and county basis. This Amendment extends Sunday hunting to the 98 other counties with the exclusion of Mecklenburg and Wake. Senator Smith-Ingram stated, "I believe in honoring the Sabbath, the question is what day is your Sabbath? Is it Friday, Saturday or Sunday and how do I reconcile what I believe in as well as what my constituents believe in?" Senator Smith-Ingram further commented that her family and community look forward to enjoying the great outdoors on Sunday afternoons without the worry of hunters and sounds of gun shots. Despite her efforts, the Amendment failed 18-29.

Senator Erica Smith-Ingram proposed an amendment to House Bill 465, an act to clarify and modify certain laws pertaining to abortion. The bill proposes a wait time of 72 hours. Senator Smith-Ingram's proposed amendment reduces the wait time from 72 hours to 48 hours. Eighty-percent of the States - 20 of the 25 states that require wait periods - have a 24-hour requirement. "Increasing the wait time is insulting to women and implies that women are incapable of making sound decisions," stated Senator Smith-Ingram. "We (women) have brains and bodies and you (men) have no ability to understand this decision that is made by women about their bodies. It is a very difficult decision and it is patronizing to say that I cannot make up my mind and need 72 hours to consider other options." Senator Smith-Ingram's Amendment failed with a 14 - 33 vote, but Senator Smith-Ingram refused to quit in her efforts to protect and advocate for women and children. She introduced that would make North Carolina the 22nd State prohibiting the shackling of pregnant incarcerated women. Senator Smith-Ingram commended the NC Department of Corrections (NC DOC) for precluding the use of hand, waist, and leg restraints in its policy manual. Senator Smith-Ingram affirms the right to secure the basic human and Constitutional rights of incarcerated women by ensuring that NC DOC's current practices become a matter of law. Senator Smith-Ingram stressed to the Chamber that it is imperative to promote healthy pregnancies for all women regardless of socioeconomic status. Following bi-partisan support Senator Smith-Ingram withdrew her amendment and is working with leadership to have the protection of all women and children added to the bill.

House Bill 552, introduced by Representative McGrady, criminalizes the acts of individuals who engage in graffiti vandalism, which according to Senator Erica Smith-Ingram mostly affect teenagers. "Once again we are criminalizing the non-violent behaviors of children and stemming their future. Children should not receive felony convictions for graffiti! This is obstructing their ability to receive quality collegiate education, employment, and ultimately to receive a brighter future." HB 552 passed with a 40-9 vote.
