ORDER CLOSING A PORTION OF BILLIP CLUB ROAD (S.R. 1123)

This matter coming on to be heard by the Bertie County Board of Commissioners on Tuesday, June 1, 2021, pursuant to Section 153A-241 of the North Carolina General Statutes regarding a petition that was filed to close a portion of Billip Club Road (S.R. 1123), and after opportunity for interested persons to be heard, the Board of Commissioners makes the following findings of fact:

- 1. Upon the petition of Wild Hog Plantation, LLC (hereinafter "the Petitioner"), the Bertie County Board of Commissioners resolved on June 1, 2020, pursuant to NCGS 136-63 to request that the North Carolina Department of Transportation abandon the terminal 0.96 miles of S.R. 1123 (Billip Club Road) from the State road maintenance system, and pursuant to NCGS 153A-241 the Commissioners declared their intent to close that section of road if NCDOT granted the County's request.
- 2. Billip Club Road (S.R. 1123) (hereinafter "the Road") is located in Woodville Township, Bertie County, North Carolina and was at the time of the County's Resolution in the State's secondary road system.
- 3. The terminal end of the Road is located entirely within property that is owned by the Petitioner.
- 4. There are no other landowners who use the terminal end of the Road to gain access to their property.
- 5. The Petitioner desires to close the terminal end of the Road because of illegal dumping, parking, littering, trespassing and poaching in the vicinity of the end of the Road.
- 6. The portion of the Road that the Petitioner has asked to be closed, which is referred to at times in this Order as "the terminal end", is located to the South of GPS coordinates 36 degrees, 1 minute, 2 seconds North; 77 degrees, 10 minutes, 37 seconds West, which point is shown with a yellow line on a photograph and on a tax map that are attached to the County's Resolution. This portion of the Road is approximately one mile in length.
- 7. On September 3, 2020, the North Carolina Department of Transportation granted the County's request and abandoned the subject 0.96 miles of SR 1123 from the road maintenance system. Pursuant to the Resolution, the County then proceeded to follow the steps set out in Section 153A-241 of the North Carolina General Statutes to permanently close the subject portion of the Road to the public.

- 8. The County caused a notice of public hearing reasonably calculated to give full and fair disclosure of the proposed closing to be published once a week for three successive weeks and to be posted on the Road.
- 9. The public hearing was conducted on June 1, 2021, and after said the hearing the Commissioners are satisfied that closing the subject portion of the Road is not contrary to the public interest and that no individual owning property in the vicinity of the subject portion of the Road would thereby be deprived of a reasonable means of ingress and egress to his or her property.

NOW, THEREFORE, based upon the foregoing findings of fact, the Bertie County Board of Commissioners does hereby order the closure of the terminal end of Billip Club Road (SR 1123), which section of Road is approximately 0.96 miles in length and is more particularly described in paragraphs 6 and 7 above.

Upon motion duly made and seconded, the above Order was unanimously adopted by the Bertie County Board of Commissioners at their regularly scheduled meeting held on the $1^{\rm st}$ day of June, 2021.

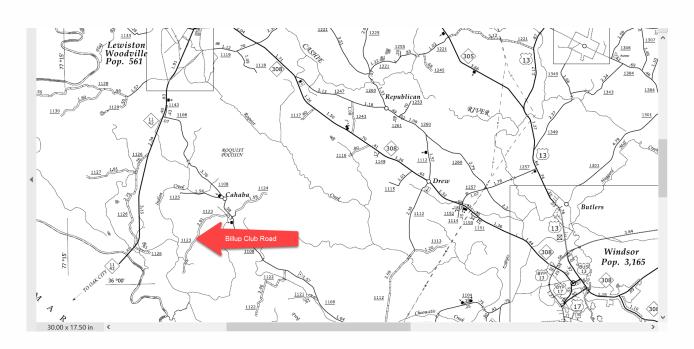

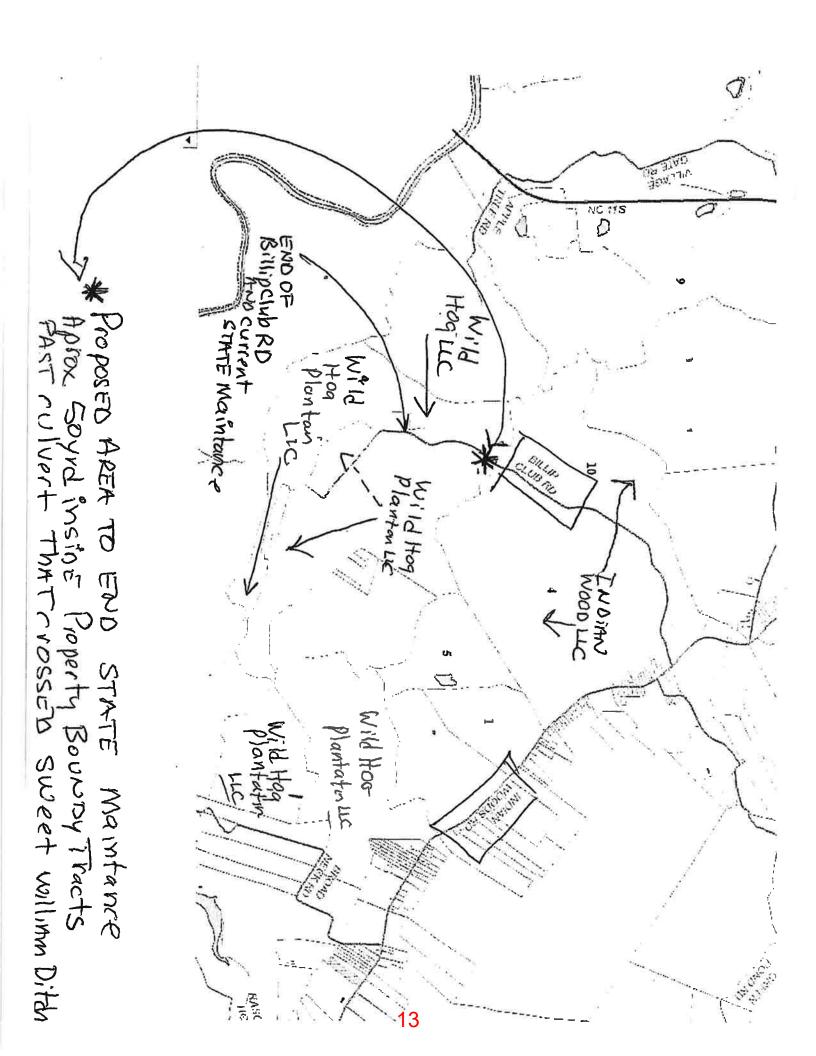
VICINITY MAP

A RESOLUTION TO REQUEST NCDOT TO ABANDON A PORTION OF BILLIP CLUB ROAD (S.R. 1123) FROM THE STATE SECONDARY ROAD SYSTEM AND TO DECLARE THE INTENT OF THE BERTIE COUNTY BOARD OF COMMISSIONERS TO CLOSE THE SAME UPON NCDOT ABANDONMENT

WHEREAS, pursuant to N.C.G.S. 136-63, a Board of County Commissioners may request the North Carolina Board of Transportation to abandon any road in the secondary system when the best interest of the people of the county will be served thereby;

WHEREAS, once a road is removed from the State's secondary road system and is no longer under the control and supervision of the State, a County Board of Commissioners may adopt a resolution declaring its intent to close the public road and then follow the procedure set out in N.C.G.S. 153A-241 to close the road;

WHEREAS, Billip Club Road (S.R. 1123) Is located in Woodville Township, Bertie County, North Carolina and is in the State's secondary road system;

WHEREAS, the terminal end of Billip Club Road is located entirely within property that is owned by Wild Hog Plantation, LLC (hereinafter "the Petitioner");

WHEREAS, there are no other landowners who use the terminal end of Billip Club Road to gain access to their property;

WHEREAS, the Petitioner desires to close the terminal end of the road because of illegal dumping, parking, littering, trespassing and poaching in the vicinity of the road;

WHEREAS, the Petitioner has submitted an Abandonment Petition to NCDOT asking that it abandon the portion of Billip Club Road that is located inside the boundaries of the Petitioner's property. This portion is located to the South of GPS coordinates 36 degrees, 1 minute, 2 seconds North; 77 degrees, 10 minutes, 37 seconds West, which point is shown with a yellow line on the attached photograph, in the Petitioner's attached Petition, and on the attached tax map. This portion of the road is approximately one mile in length;

WHEREAS, the Bertie County Board of Commissioners is in favor of the Petitioner's request;

WHEREAS, when the Board of Transportation removes the subject portion of Billip Club Road from its secondary road system, it is the intent of the Bertle

County Board of Commissioners to follow the procedures set out In N.C.G.S. 153A-241 to close it and to call a public hearing on the question.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, by the Bertie County Board of Commissioners that:

- Pursuant to NC.G.S. 136-63, the Bertie County Board of Commissioners requests that the North Carolina Board of Transportation abandon the portion of Billip Club Road that is located to the South of GPS coordinates 36 degrees, 1 minute, 2 seconds North; 77 degrees, 10 minutes, 37 seconds West from the State's secondary road system. The proposed new end of state maintenance is shown with a yellow line on the attached photograph, in the Petitioner's attached Petition, and on the attached tax map.
- 2. Pursuant to N.C.G.S. 153A-241, the Bertie County Board of Commissioners declares its intent to close the subject portion of Billip Club Road when the North Carolina Board of Transportation removes it from the State's secondary road system. When the subject portion of the road is dropped from the State system, a public hearing will be held by the Bertie County Board of Commissioners to consider an order closing the subject portion of the road. The County Manager is directed to publish at that time a notice of the public hearing once a week for three successive weeks before the hearing and to post the notice in at least two places along the subject portion of the road.

Upon motion duly made and seconded, the above Resolution was unanimously adopted by the Bertie County Board of Commissioners at their regularly scheduled meeting held on the 1st day of June, 2020.

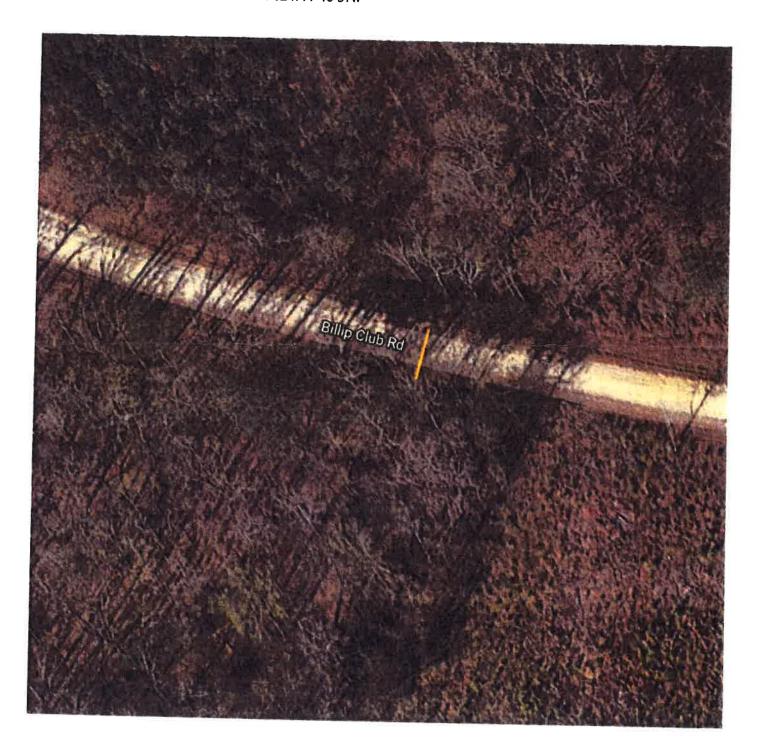

HOPE PROGRAM OVERVIEW

HOPE Program Applications Reopening

The NC Housing Opportunities and Prevention of Evictions (HOPE) Program is reopening applications soon. The HOPE Program provides rent and utility bill assistance to renters who have been financially impacted by the COVID-19 pandemic. The HOPE Program has been updated since the first open application period. This fact sheet is intended to inform tenants, landlords and utility providers about how the new program works.

AREAS SERVED

The HOPE Program will serve very low-income renters in 88 North Carolina counties. Very low income is defined as earning less than or equal to 50% of the area median income for the county where the renter lives. The 12 counties listed below received direct federal funding for rent and utility assistance programs. If you live in the one of these counties, you should apply to your local rent and utility assistance program instead of the HOPE Program:

BuncombeForsythMecklenburgCabarrusGastonNew HanoverCumberlandGuilfordUnionDurhamJohnstonWake

Native American tribes also received direct federal funding for rent and utility assistance programs. Recognized members of the following tribes will be served by programs managed by their tribal governments: Eastern Band of Cherokee Indians, Coharie Tribe, Haliwa-Saponi Indian Tribe, Lumbee Tribe of North Carolina and Waccamaw-Siouan Tribe.

ELIGIBILITY

Very low-income renters are eligible for rent and utility assistance from the HOPE Program. To qualify for assistance, you must meet all of the following requirements:

- You rent your place of residence.
- You have missed rent or utility payment(s) sometime since April 1, 2020, or been faced with homelessness or possible eviction.
 - You do not have to be late on your rent when you apply in order to qualify for assistance.
 - Being late on an essential utility sometime since April 1, 2020 qualifies as being at risk of eviction or homelessness.
- You have lost income or been unemployed due to the COVID-19 pandemic, or experienced significant costs or financial hardship from the pandemic.
- You have a household income that is less that 50 percent of the area median income for the county
 where they live. You can check your county's area median income using the <u>HUD 2021 Income Limits</u>
 <u>Documentation System</u> calculation tool.
- You live in one of the 88 counties that the HOPE Program serves. However, if you live in one of the 88 counties and are a recognized member of one of the tribes listed above, you will be served by your

tribal government's rent and utility assistance program.

BENEFITS

Rent Assistance

The new phase of the HOPE Program will pay the monthly rent you owe to your landlord, up to the fair market rent for a 2-bedroom unit in your county. You can find the county fair market rent limits using the 2021 HUD Fair Market Rent Documentation System. Rent limits are rounded down to the nearest \$5 for easier calculation.

Eligible applicants may receive up to 12 months of rent assistance, which may include up to nine months of past due rent. Rent assistance provided during the first phase of the HOPE Program counts towards the nine months of past due rent assistance that an applicant can receive.

The program also pays three months of future rent at a time, with 12 months being the maximum amount of assistance the program can provide in total. If the applicant has not exhausted 12 months of rent assistance, and funds are available, then an applicant may apply for additional rounds rent assistance if they still require rent assistance. Federal grant guidance requires that applicants re-apply and re-qualify every three months to ensure that the applicant continues to qualify for assistance.

Rent assistance is paid to the landlord on behalf of the eligible applicant. Landlords that accept this phase of HOPE funds agree to not evict the applicant for non-payment of rent during the period of assistance and for at least 60 days after that period ends.

Utility Assistance

Utility assistance is available to applicants that apply and qualify for rent assistance. Utility-only applications will not be accepted in this phase of the HOPE Program.

The program covers essential utilities, up to a maximum amount. Those utilities and the maximum assistance amounts are as follows:

- Electricity: up to \$510
- Natural gas, propane or heating oil: up to \$135
- Water: up to \$105
- Wastewater: up to \$120

Applicants who reapply for rent assistance may also reapply for utility assistance. Utility assistance will be paid directly to the utility provider on behalf of the applicant. Utility assistance provided during the first phase of the HOPE Program counts towards the 12 months of past due utility assistance that an applicant can receive.

Rent and utility assistance is provided based on the availability of funding.

HOPE PROGRAM APPLICANT FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS

How do I qualify for rent and utility assistance from the HOPE Program?

Very low-income renters are eligible for rent and utility assistance from the HOPE Program. To qualify for assistance, you must meet all of the following requirements:

- You rent your place of residence.
- You have missed rent payment(s) sometime since April 1, 2020, or been faced with homelessness or possible eviction,
- You have lost income or been unemployed due to the COVID-19 pandemic, or experienced significant costs or financial hardship from the pandemic,
- You have a household income that is less that 50 percent of the area median income for the
 county where they live. You can check your county's area median income using the HUD 2021
 HUD 2021
 Income Limits Documentation System calculation tool.
- You live in one of the 88 counties that the HOPE Program serves.
 - If you live in the following counties, you will need to apply to your local program: Buncombe, Cabarrus, Cumberland, Durham, Forsyth, Gaston, Guilford, Johnston, Mecklenburg, New Hanover, Union, and Wake. You can find contact information on HOPE Program website or by calling 2-1-1.
 - If you are a recognized member of one of the following tribes, you will be served by your tribal government's rent and utility assistance program: Eastern Band of the Cherokee Indians, Coharie Tribe, Haliwa-Saponi Tribe, Lumbee Tribe of North Carolina and Waccamaw-Siouan Tribe.

How do I apply? What if I don't have access to the internet?

You can apply online by going to hope.nc.gov. You can use your smartphone, tablet or computer. If you don't have access to the internet, you can contact the HOPE Program Call Center at (888) 9ASK-HOPE or (888) 927-5467 to apply by phone. You can also contact the Call Center if you have questions about completing your online application.

What do I need to apply?

A head of household must apply for assistance from the HOPE Program. A head of household is defined as a person that can make decisions on behalf of the entire household. That person needs to gather the following information in order to complete the application:

- household income, including all income from all members of your household,
- lease or other proof of a rental relationship between the household and a landlord to show that you are a renter. If you do not have a lease, you may instead submit:

- o A completed Lease Summary form, which must be signed by your landlord, or
- A written statement from your landlord with your name, explaining how much your lease is a month, your rent address, how many months late you are, and when the lease ends, or
- Proof of payment such as a check or bank statement showing a deposit to your landlord for the amount of the rent.
- your landlord's name, e-mail address and other contact information. Having your landlord's e-mail address is essential to providing rent assistance,
- the most recent utility bill for any essential utility (electricity, water, wastewater/sewer, or natural gas/heating fuel) for which you need assistance,
- HOPE applicant ID number if you received assistance from the HOPE Program previously

Can I apply for more HOPE benefits if I received rent and/or utility assistance from the HOPE Program before? What if I received assistance from another program?

You can receive assistance from the HOPE Program if you received assistance in the first phase of the program as long as you continue to need assistance and otherwise qualify according to the eligibility requirements. You should be aware that the assistance you received from the previous phase of the program will count toward the 12-month maximum assistance that you may receive.

You may be eligible for assistance from the HOPE Program if you received assistance from another source, but you must disclose that assistance to your assigned HOPE Specialist, since the HOPE Program may not duplicate other assistance that you have already received.

My family has lost income due to the pandemic and we have fallen behind on utilities, but we have kept up with rent. Can my family still qualify for rent and utility assistance?

Yes, being late on an essential utility (electricity, water, wastewater/sewer, or natural gas/heating fuel) is enough to qualify for rent and utility assistance if you meet the other eligibility criteria. For this phase of the HOPE Program, you do not have to behind on your rent to qualify for rent assistance but you must request and be eligible for rent assistance to also receive utility assistance. Utility assistance is not offered as a standalone award.

How much of my rent will the HOPE Program pay?

The new phase of the HOPE Program will pay the monthly rent you owe to your landlord, up to the fair market rent for a 2-bedroom apartment in your county. You can find the county fair market rent limits using the 2021 HUD Fair Market Rent Documentation System. Eligible applicants can receive up to 12 months of rent assistance, which includes up to nine months of past due rent. Rent assistance provided during the first phase of the HOPE Program counts towards the total 12 months of total rent assistance that an applicant can receive.

The program also pays three months of future rent at a time, with 12 months being the maximum

amount assistance the program can provide in total. If the applicant has not exhausted 12 months of rent assistance, and funds are available, then an applicant may apply for additional rounds of rent assistance if they still require rent assistance. Federal grant guidance requires that applicants re-apply and re-qualify every three months to ensure that the applicant continues to qualify for assistance.

What kind of utilities can I get help to pay? How much will the HOPE Program pay?

The HOPE Program provides utility assistance for electricity, water, sewer/wastewater, natural gas and heating fuel. You will need to upload your most recent utility bill for any utility that you need help paying. Assistance is available for past due essential utilities, which may not exceed the following amounts:

• Electricity: up to \$510

• Natural gas, propane or heating oil: up to \$135

• Water: up to \$105

Wastewater: up to \$120

Applicants that continue to have a rent and utility assistance need may reapply to receive utility assistance at a later date, if program funds remain. Utility assistance will be paid directly to the utility provider on behalf of the applicant.

What are the steps for getting assistance?

These are steps for getting assistance from the HOPE Program:

1. Application

You should complete the online application and upload all required documents or apply by phone and provide documents as instructed by the HOPE Program helpline.

2. Eligibility Review

Your application and documents will be reviewed by the HOPE Program to determine if your household is eligible for assistance. If your household is not eligible, you will be informed by the program the reason that you are not eligible.

3. Award

If you are found to be eligible, the amount of your award will be calculated and you will be notified of the amount and types of awards that your household can receive.

4. Agreements

In order to receive assistance, you and your landlord must enter into an agreement in order for the awards to be paid. Both you and your landlord must sign the Landlord and Tenant Agreement and your landlord must provide a W-9 for the award to move to payment. All of these documents will be provided through e-mail and are signed electronically.

5. Payment

Once all required agreements and W-9s are signed and provided to the HOPE Program, the award will move to payment. Failure to respond and complete the required documents within 21 days of receiving them will result in your award being canceled. Therefore, it is important that you check your e-mail frequently and respond quickly in order to obtain assistance.

I would like someone I trust to help me apply for the HOPE Program. Is that permitted?

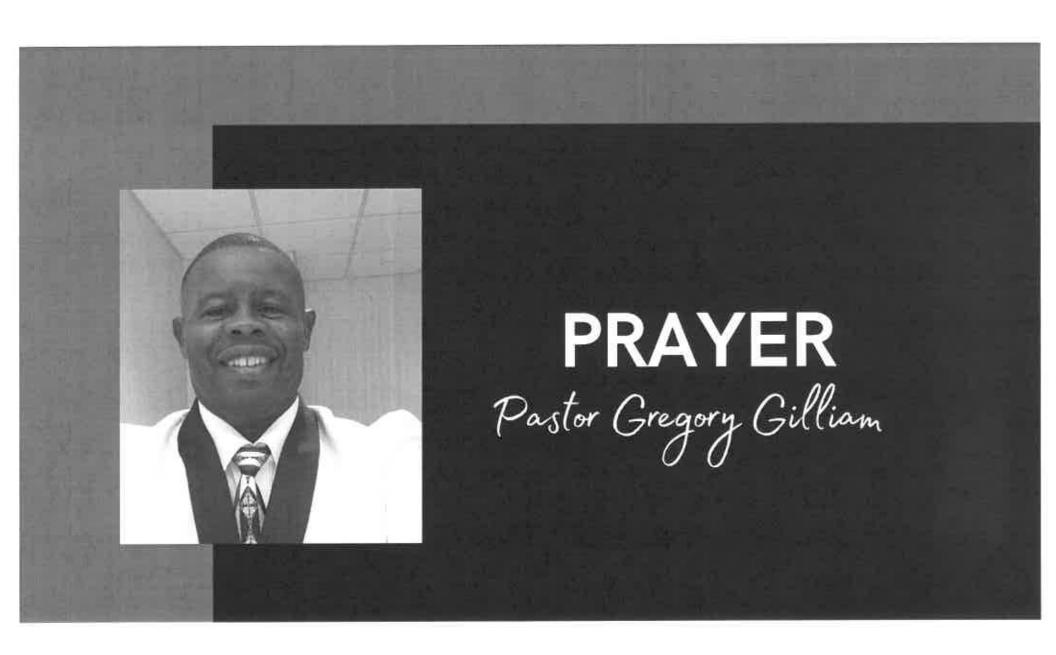
Yes, you may allow someone who you trust to help you with your application process. In order for the HOPE Program to be able to share sensitive information with the person that you would like to help you, you should complete the <u>Communication Designee Form</u> and upload the form with your application.

If you would like for someone to be able to act on your behalf, you should upload a signed <u>Power of Attorney Form</u> that names the person that is authorized to act on your behalf.

You can designate a co-applicant (co-head of household) that lives in the household with you to make decisions on behalf of the household when you apply or reapply for assistance without needing a communication designee form.

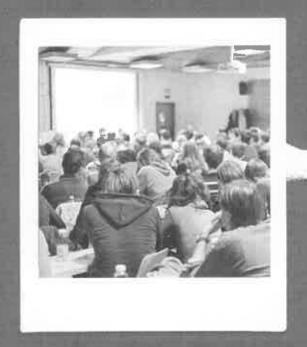

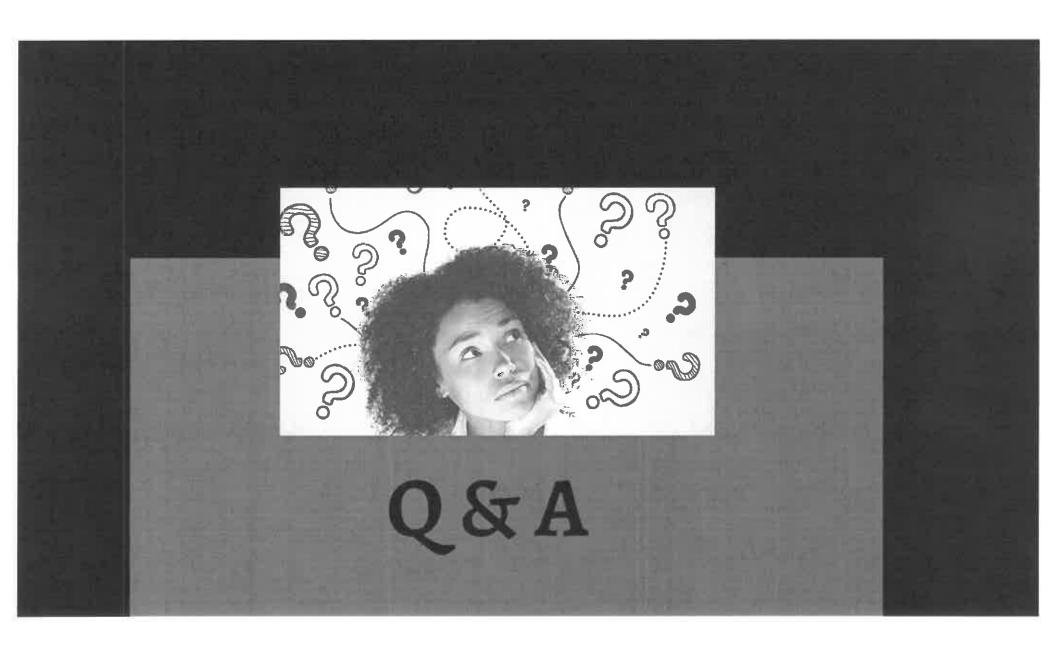

ALBEMARLE REGIONAL HEALTH SERVICES PROVIDES UPDATE ON REGIONAL VACCINE CLINICS Updated COVID-19 vaccine counts, cases, and outbreaks

Elizabeth City, NC – Albemarle Regional Health Services (ARHS) is providing updated information on COVID-19 vaccines, lab confirmed positive COVID-19 cases, and facility outbreaks as of 1 p.m. Friday, May 28, 2021 in addition to the weekly surveillance report (attached). Please note, our vaccination percentages on the surveillance report are now based on the regional 12 and older population. Vaccine partner estimates are based on vaccines allocated to partners in the eight-county region and federal vaccine allocation to pharmacies in the region.

ARHS is accepting vaccine appointments for first and second dose Moderna and Johnson and Johnson at each of our local health departments. Appointments will be available to residents of the eight county region who are 18 and older. Individuals, who received their first dose of Moderna at any of our eight locations and are in need of their second dose, can also schedule an appointment.

ARHS is continuing to accept appointments for youth ages 12-17 living in the eight-county region for the Pfizer vaccine. If your child is between the ages of 12 to 17 and you would like for them to receive the Pfizer vaccine, please call your local health department to schedule an appointment.

ARHS is continuing to monitor the facility outbreak at Chowan River Rehabilitation and Nursing. Currently there is one resident and one staff member with lab-confirmed positive results.

ARHS is reporting additional COVID-19 related deaths in Bertie and Hertford County residents. These individuals were both over the age 65 and succumbed to complications from the virus. In addition, ARHS is reporting one COVID-19 related death in a Pasquotank County resident. This individual was in the 18-24 year age range and succumbed to complications from the virus. These deaths are not related to a facility outbreak.

Although we are in the vaccine phase of the pandemic, COVID-19 testing is still available for those meeting criteria by appointment only at the local health departments across the region. ARHS encourages residents to call their primary care provider for an assessment or information on testing availability before calling the local health department. If someone does not have a primary care home, ARHS does offer primary care services. All tests will be completed through a curbside screening clinic at the local health department. For more information on criteria for COVID-19 testing or appointments, call 252-338-WELL/9355 or your local health department directly.

ARHS is collaborating with OptumServe to provide additional, no-cost COVID-19 testing sites in Bertie, Hertford, Gates, and Chowan counties. Typically testing is available Monday, Thursday, and Saturday from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m. and Tuesday and Friday from 1 - 5 p.m. You may check availability and register to make an appointment for testing by visiting https://lhi.care/covidtesting or by calling (877) - 562-4850.

ARHS is continuing to ask our community citizens to be mindful in practicing preventive and safety measures to prevent the spread of COVID-19. Please remember these precautions:

- Avoid close contact with people who are sick.
- Avoid touching your eyes, nose, and mouth.
- Stay home when you are sick.
- Cover your cough or sneeze with a tissue, then throw the tissue in the trash.
- Clean and disinfect frequently touched objects and surfaces using a regular household cleaning spray or wipe.
- Wash your hands often with soap and water for at least 20 seconds, especially after going to the bathroom; before eating; and after blowing your nose, coughing, or sneezing. If soap and water are not readily available, use an alcohol-based hand sanitizer with at least 60% alcohol. Always wash hands with soap and water if hands are visibly dirty.
- Practice social distancing; stay at least six feet away from others, avoid unnecessary travel, avoid handshakes, hugs and other close contact.
- Wear a cloth face covering in public when not fully vaccinated.

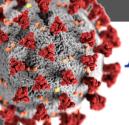

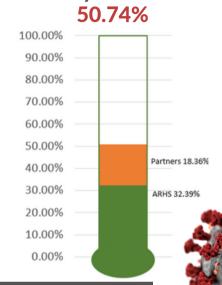

ARHS: COVID-19 First Dose Administrations by County

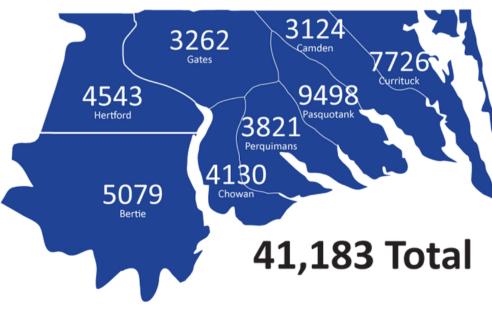

ARHS: COVID-19 Second Dose & One Dose Administrations by County

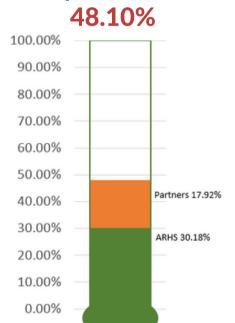

Windsor, North Carolina January 4, 2021 REGULAR MEETING

The Bertie County Board of Commissioners met for a regularly scheduled meeting today inside the Commissioners Room, 106 Dundee Street, Windsor, NC. Due to the COVID-19 pandemic, this meeting was hosted partially in person and partially via Zoom (conference call). The following members were present or absent:

CALL TO ORDER

Chair Lee called the meeting to order.

INVOCATION/PLEDGE OF ALLEGIANCE

Commissioner Wesson gave the Invocation and led the Pledge of Allegiance.

PUBLIC COMMENTS

Chair Lee stated that there are rules for public comments that can be found on the Facebook page and the website. Chair Lee asked Director Cortney Ward if there were any public comments.

Director Cortney Ward began by providing a brief overview of the public comments' rules and procedures.

Director Cortney Ward stated the first public comment to present was from Chair Wesley Dudley of the Bertie County Democratic Party: "The Bertie County Democratic Party would like to extend a warm appreciation for the consideration of their nominee Mr. James Lee for the vacated District V Commissioners seat in accordance with NCGS."

Director Cortney Ward stated the next public comment was from Mr. James Pugh, who stated he was writing to ask the Board of Commissioners to please respect the nomination of the Bertie County Democratic Party for Mr. James Lee to fill the vacant seat, previously held by Mrs. Ernestine Bazemore.

Director Cortney Ward stated the next public comment was from Pastor Samuel Shaw of Mt. Olive Missionary Baptist Church in support of the Democratic nomination for Mr. James Lee to fill the vacant seat previously held by Mrs. Bazemore.

Director Cortney Ward stated the next public comment came from John Davis, whose letter stated that Mr. James Lee was fully qualified with a seventy-six percent vote from the Democratic Party Leadership to fill the vacant seat of Ms. Bazemore. As read by Director Cortney Ward, the letter further stated that Mr. Davis hopes the board would support the recommendation of the Democratic Party Leadership to allow Mr. James Lee to fill the vacant seat previously held by Mrs. Bazemore.

Director Cortney Ward stated the final comment was from Dr. Kenny Barber. Dr. Barber stated that his opinion was strictly nonpartisan and he presently speaks in a nonpartisan voice. Mr. Barber's letter stated that any office of government that is fair and just should automatically govern according to the will of the people's majority when logical and reasonable. If any elected official fails to do this simple task, they are saying to the people that their personal agenda is more important than your group agenda. The vacant position previously held by Senator-Elect Ernestine Bazemore is one of legacy and honor. Dr. Barber further stated it is his hope that due to the pain and suffering of this Tier 1 county that The Board of Commissioners have already decided to accept the people's majority so that we can move on to greater accomplishments for the betterment of Bertie County and its citizens.

Chair Lee publicly thanked the citizens who came to the rescue and assisted the deputy whose car recently caught fire after an accident.

APPOINTMENTS & REPORTS

2021 Crossroads Magazine by Anna Phipps of the Roanoke-Chowan News Herald

Anna thanked everyone for allowing her to come and discuss the magazine. Anna stated that the Crossroads Magazine is one of the most important pieces they publish as it is a comprehensive look at the Roanoke-Chowan area. For the 2021 edition, the editorial staff will seek out the unique stories behind the historical markers that got the Roanoke-Chowan area landscaped. The Roanoke-Chowan News Herald will print 9,000 copies that will be inserted in their paid publications on February 24th and February 25th. The readership includes Bertie, Hertford, and Northampton counties. They will also distribute additional copies to the Chamber of Commerce offices, Economic Development government offices, and Welcome Centers. Anna requested support again this year.

Commissioner Wesson made a **MOTION** to purchase page three again and the add-on for one-hundred dollars. Commissioner Trent **SECONDED** the motion. The **MOTION PASSED** with a 5-0 vote.

Library & Cooperative Extension Construction Project Update by MHA Works Project Architects Amber Idol & Dani Hoff

Amber Idol provided a brief update beginning with the good news that this month's progress is on target. However, the site is still extremely wet, so the parking lot has not been paved yet. The two items mentioned in previous meetings that remain hold-ups are (1) the two-hour glazing that is along the library wall that separates the library faces and the gallery and (2) the other windows for the exterior, which will be on site next week.

Commissioner Wesson asked about the anticipated completion date at this point. Amber stated at this point, it really depends on the building inspector and whether he's going to allow people to move in, and having the parking lot paved. Amber stated they would know better in a couple of weeks when things progress. She stated the building will be ready, so we should still be able to have the ribbon cutting in March.

Emergency Management Financial Update by Colleton Software Senior Vice President Dave Pickren

Mr. Pickren stated Thomas Smith, who is in their Irwin, SC office and handles Non-Emergency Transport (NET), was also on the call. They followed up with some of items that came up in the October meeting. They reviewed figures for NET from calendar year 2020 and how they anticipate finishing 2021.

Mr. Smith stated things are going in the right direction. They completed the first wave up paperwork and billed roughly \$70,000 to \$80,000 worth of charges. On top of that, they have an additional \$70,000 to \$80,000 worth of charges pending, basically on the Medicare side. This month Medicare has finally loosened their requirements for paperwork, understanding we are in the midst of a pandemic.

Mr. Pickren added that it has been a collaborative effort with Director Mitch Cooper and Bertie County. Weekly calls have been held while working with Governor Cooper's staff to obtain the necessary information. The end goal is to get the County paid. Mr. Pickren stated they have cleared somewhere between \$55,000 to \$60,000 in the past 90 days. This is something they will continue to work on probably for years to come.

Commissioner Wesson asked how much of the gap has been closed regarding where we were when we last spoke in October compared to what you're now anticipating. Mr. Pickren stated he estimated about another \$100,000 to \$125,000 from calls in 2020 that they're working to receive.

Commissioner Trent asked Mr. Pickren what the collection rate is right now. Mr. Pickren stated the collection rate for the County is running about 72 to 73 percent and on the non-emergent it's about 78 to 80 percent. Mr. Pickren also stated it was actually a little bit ahead. On the 911 side,

we are ahead as well. Dave stated he likes to see the non-emergent side above 80. A goal of 80 percent has been set and they are working to get to that goal.

Chair Lee thanked Emergency Management and Colleton Software for their hard work.

Appointment of Bertie County Commissioner Representing District V

Chair Lee opened the floor for nominations. Commissioner Trent nominated Ron Roberson. Commissioner Atkins seconded this nomination.

Commissioner Wesson nominated the recommendation of the Democratic Party, Mr. James Lee.

Commissioner Wesson then a called point of order and requested to read the following statement into record: "The citizens of this county have a right to know that this vote we are about to take has been rigged from the very start. These three Commissioners Mr. Trent, Mrs. Lee, and Mr. Atkins communicated together and decided to elect Mr. Roberson prior to the Democratic Party having a chance to interview and recommend a candidate from their party as required by General Statutes. Mr. Trent, an Independent, approached Mrs. Lee and she agreed to support Mr. Roberson and they both approached Mr. Atkins and sought his support. Mr. Wesson stated that Mr. Roberson called him directly and asked him if he would support him. Mr. Wesson stated he told Mr. Roberson clearly that he would support the nominee of the Democratic Party and if that turned out to be him, he would support that decision. Mr. Roberson then thanked him and stated that he already had the support of the other commissioners. Commissioner Wesson stated that he then called Commissioner Atkins and asked if this was true. Mr. Atkins confirmed that Mr. Trent had first gone to Mrs. Lee and they both encouraged him to support Mr. Roberson. He then told him that he was favoring Mr. Roberson but had not yet made up his mind and understands now that may have changed. But what now makes this now especially egregious is that the Democratic Party did things the right way. They sought all candidates who expressed interest and after interviewing all four candidates publicly, they asked the precinct chair, the vice chair, and the elected party officials to discuss the candidates with the citizens of their precinct across the county before voting. Mr. Lee received 76 percent of all the votes, more than three out of four of every vote casts. Mr. Roberson was one of the candidates interviewed, but was not selected. But, the fix was already in. These commissioners have in essence said the hell with the will of these citizens and they made that decision prior to ever starting. Didn't anyone say we should listen to the recommendation of the Democratic Party as required statutorily before making any decisions as to who would fill this seat? That never happened. This is wrong and this is a perfect example of what is wrong with our government today. Those elected to listen to the citizens, all too often, decide what they want to do before they listen to the people. Thank you very much."

Commissioner Atkins stated he takes issue with the term "rigged" being used.

Chair Lee also stated she did not appreciate the use of the term "rigged" because it was not rigged. She stated she received a call from Mr. Trent and she informed him she had not made up her mind about who to vote for to fill the current vacancy. However, after talking to others, including her husband, who holds Mr. Roberson in high regards, and after Mr. Roberson

contacted her and shared his qualifications and why he wanted to serve, she did agree to support Mr. Roberson.

Commissioner Wesson stated rigged was the correct word and a better word might be collusion because General Statute advises us to hear the recommendation. He stated that what he understands and what was just confirmed was that the decision was made prior to the Democratic Party being notified to provide a recommendation.

Commissioner Atkins asked Commissioner Wesson if he recalled calling him twice.

Commissioner Wesson confirmed that he did call to verify what he was told by Mr. Roberson and informed Commissioner Atkins that he would be supporting the recommendation of the Democratic Party.

Chair Lee and Commissioner Atkins stated they weren't asked by Commissioner Trent to vote for Mr. Roberson, but rather, Commissioner Trent informed them he was voting for Mr. Roberson.

Commissioner Wesson asked why he nor Ms. Bazemore were contacted since Commissioners Trent, Atkins, and Lee had been in communication.

Chair Lee stated Ms. Bazemore does not have a vote in this decision.

A vote was taken to appoint Ron Roberson to fill the remainder of Ms. Ernestine Bazemore's term. The **MOTION PASSED** with a 3-1 vote. The dissenting vote was cast by Commissioner Wesson.

County Manager Vaughan stated that no decisions were made with regards to a commitment to the project. However, all Commissioners in attendance did agree to pursue funding and they were going to do that by approaching their legislators and each County Manager would come back and let each manager know exactly what was discussed and what progress has been made within each county.

Chair Lee stated that she had contacted Representative Goodwin and he likes the idea and was going to get with others who represent those three counties to see what could be done once they go back into session.

Commissioner Wesson stated that it would be a good idea to get Senator Bazemore involved as her assistance could certainly be used.

Chair Lee

Chair Lee stated that furniture would begin being moved in the Tri-County Airport next week. She further stated that there is still a water issue and a fire hydrant issue they are working to resolve. Chair Lee stated she received a picture from Mayor Harrell of the flooding in the Long Branch community. There is a beaver problem in that community and they also have some ditches that need cleaning. DOT is supposed to take a look at that as well. Chair Lee stated that she spoke to several people about paying to remove the beaver issue. There is a possibility of some of the residents sharing the the beaver dam costs of having removed.

COUNTY MANAGER'S REPORTS (F)

County Manger Vaughan stated that the Family's First Coronavirus Response Act, also known as FFCRA, required employers to provide employer-paid sick leave to employees affected by

COVID-19. This requirement expired on December 31st and has not been extended. We have contacted neighboring counties to learn what other local governments are providing. County Manager Vaughan stated that would be an agenda item for the upcoming work session on January 20th. Manager Vaughan stated determining the details of how the County would continue providing this leave for employees is important because without it, employees would be required to use their own leave.

COUNTY ATTORNEY'S REPORTS (G)

County Attorney Lloyd Smith, Jr. stated he would be emailing the Board of Commissioners a copy of the Ted Cherry complaint on tomorrow. He asked Chair Lee to come by his office to verify and sign the complaint. Attorney Smith stated he was unsure as to when court would reopen, but it is slated to reopen January 14th. However, as soon as the complaint is signed, Mr. Cherry will be served and the process will begin.

PUBLIC COMMENTS

Director Cortney Ward stated she had one comment come in the chat box. The comment was from Lalitha Ward. The comment stated, "As a citizen of Bertie County, I want to thank you for subverting the will of the people."

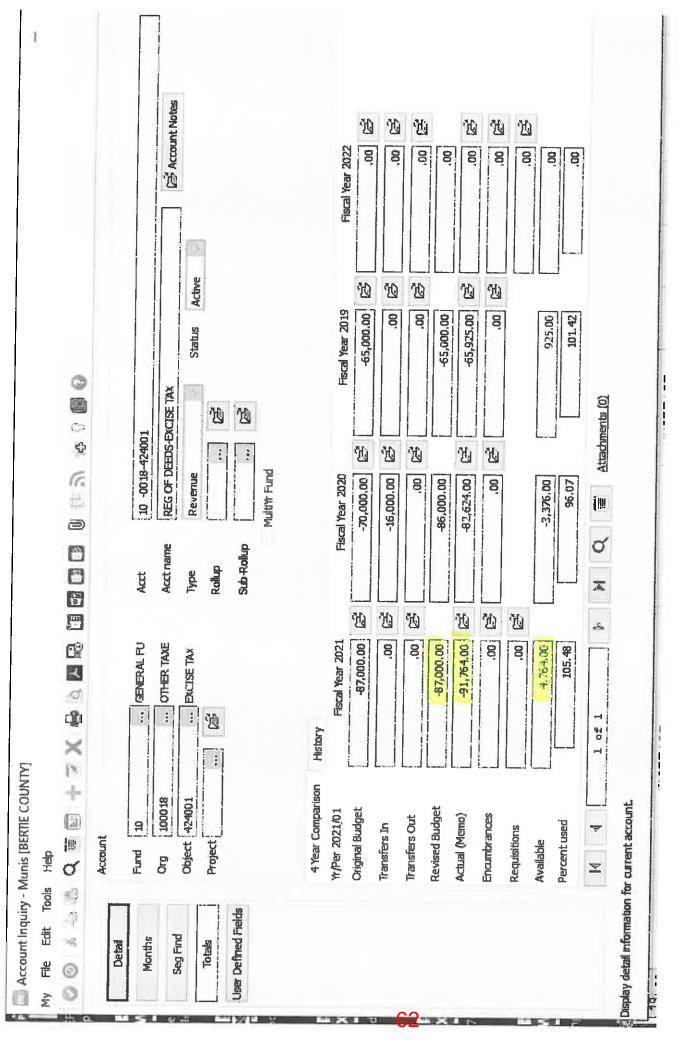

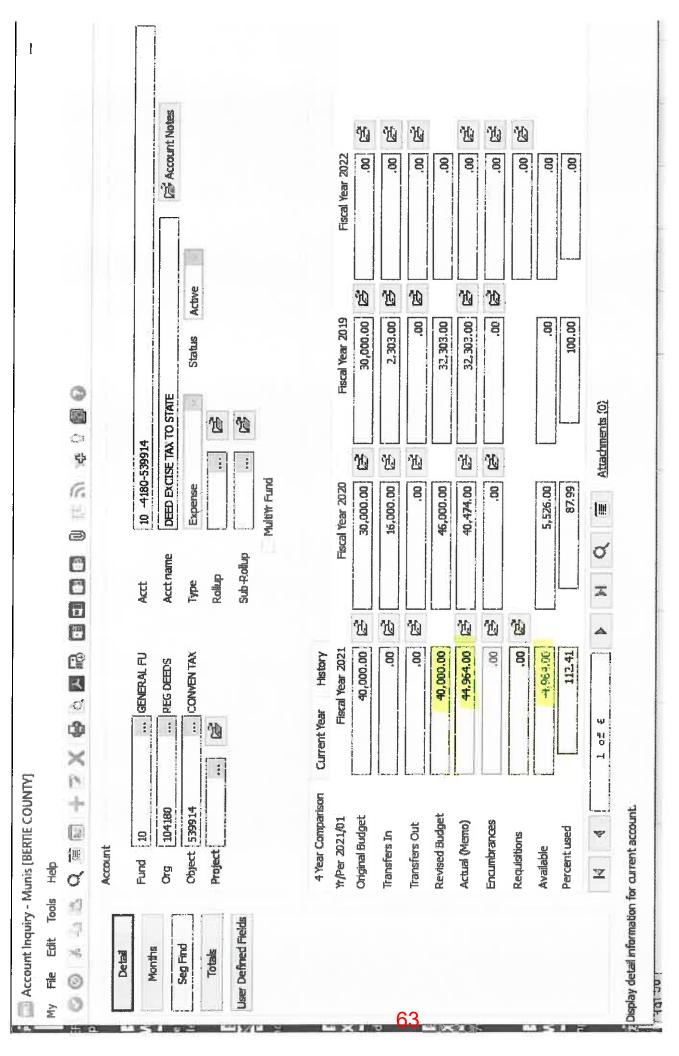

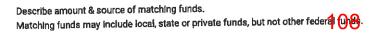

Bertie County Project Ordinance – 21-02 Coronavirus State and Local Fiscal Recovery Funds

June 1, 2021

BE IT ORDAINED by the Governing Board of the County of Bertie, North Carolina that pursuant to Section 13.2 of Chapter 159 of the General Statutes of North Carolina, the following grant project ordinance is hereby adopted:

Section I.

The Governing Board of the County of Bertie, unanimously approves the acceptance of the Coronavirus State and Local Fiscal Recovery Funds, established by the American Rescue Plan Act of 2021, to establish a budget to meet pandemic response needs and rebuild a stronger, more equitable economy as the country recovers.

Section II.

The project funds will be used to support the investment in water, sewer, and broadband infrastructure, making necessary investments to improve access to clean drinking water, support vital wastewater and stormwater infrastructure, and to expand access to broadband internet; public health expenditures, by funding COVID-19 mitigation efforts, medical expenses, behavioral healthcare, and certain public health and safety staff; address negative economic impacts caused by the public health emergency, including economic harms to workers, households, small businesses, impacted industries, and the public sector; and replace lost public sector revenue, using this funding to provide government services to the extent of the reduction in revenue experienced due to the pandemic. Eligible expenditures must be incurred between March 3, 2021 and December 31, 2024.

THIS AGREEMENT, TO PROVIDE BUILDING INSPECTION SERVICES, made and entered into effective the 5th day of June, 2021, by and between Washington County, a political subdivision of the State of North Carolina, Party of the First Part (and hereinafter referred to as WASHINGTON) and Bertie County, a political subdivision of the State of North Carolina, Party of the Second Part (and hereinafter referred to as BERTIE);

WITNESSETH:

WHEREAS, WASHINGTON and BERTIE have agreed to cooperate with each other in order to provide building inspection services within the territorial jurisdiction of Bertie County; and

WHEREAS, North Carolina General Statute 153A-353 authorizes WASHINGTON and BERTIE to enter into an agreement relating to a county providing inspection services to another county; and

WHEREAS, Part 1 of Article 20 of Chapter 160A of the North Carolina General Statutes empowers WASHINGTON and BERTIE to enter into an interlocal agreement in order to execute an undertaking whereby a unit of local government exercises any power, function, public enterprise, right, privilege, or immunity either jointly with or on behalf of another unit of local government;

NOW, THEREFORE, for and in consideration of the mutual benefits, covenants, and promises contained herein, the parties hereto agree as follows:

1. In accordance with the terms and conditions of this Agreement, WASHINGTON will provide to BERTIE the services of an experienced building inspector in order to provide inspection services within the territorial jurisdiction of Bertie County, said building inspector being hereinafter referred to as the Assisting Officer. The Assisting Officer shall be certified in the State of North

Carolina at least as a Level I Inspector in the trades of Building, Plumbing, Mechanical, Electrical, and Fire unless otherwise waived in writing by BERTIE. The inspection services will be provided upon request from BERTIE during the term of this Agreement on a schedule mutually agreed upon by WASHINGTON and BERTIE.

- 2. BERTIE will pay WASHINGTON for the provision of inspection services within the territorial jurisdiction of Bertie County by the Assisting Officer at the rate of FORTY DOLLARS & NO CENTS (\$40.00) for every hour that the Assisting Officer is providing inspection services for BERTIE, and for any time required for conducting or participating in code or statutory enforcement proceedings or court proceedings arising from the inspection services provided under this Agreement, and for commuting time in traveling to and from the worksite designated by BERTIE and the regular office of the Assisting Officer located in Plymouth, North Carolina. The payment of said hourly rate is the full compensation which BERTIE will pay WASHINGTON for the provision of inspection services hereunder. Payment will be made within thirty (30) days after the receipt by BERTIE of an invoice from WASHINGTON for the inspection services within the territorial jurisdiction of Bertie County by the Assisting Officer provided during the previous month. The total annual compensation to be paid hereunder during the initial term, or any renewal term hereunder shall not exceed \$43,784 per any single term without the express written consent of the County Manager of BERTIE.
- 3. While providing inspection services within the territorial jurisdiction of Bertie County, the Assisting Officer will have the same authority as building inspectors employed by BERTIE and shall be subject to the supervision of the Director of Planning & Inspections of BERTIE or the designated agent thereof.
- 4. It is understood and agreed that at all times, the Assisting Officer is an employee of WASHINGTON and is not an employee of BERTIE. The Assisting Officer shall not receive any employee benefits from BERTIE. WASHINGTON shall provide the Assisting Officer employee benefits which are regularly provided to its employees pursuant to its policies.

- 5. WASHINGTON shall ensure that the Assisting Officer is covered, during the time the Assisting Officer is providing inspection services within the territorial jurisdiction of Bertie County, by the Workers Compensation insurance which WASHINGTON regularly provides to its employees pursuant to its policies.
- 6. Upon request, BERTIE will also pay WASHINGTON in addition to any hourly compensation described herein, FIFTY CENTS (\$00.50) per mile travelled by the Assisting Officer in any WASHINGTON owned vehicle during the performance of this Agreement.
- 7. BERTIE will hold harmless and indemnify WASHINGTON for any claims or damages, other than workers compensation related claims, resulting from the provision of inspection services within the territorial jurisdiction of Bertie County by the Assisting Officer which are within the scope of the authority of the Assisting Officer as a building inspector to the fullest extent allowed by law.
- 8. The term of this Agreement shall be for an initial period of approximately TWELVE (12) months commencing on June, 5th, 2021, and terminating on June 30, 2022, unless sooner terminated pursuant to the provisions of paragraph 9. This Agreement may be extended for additional successive terms of twelve (12) months each upon mutual written agreement of the County Managers of WASHINGTON and BERTIE.
- 9. This Agreement may be terminated by mutual agreement of the parties or by either party, at any time, by the provision of at least fifteen (15) days written notice to the other party. BERTIE will pay WASHINGTON for all services rendered prior to the effective date of termination.
- 10. All notices, approvals, consents, requests or demands required or permitted to be given under this Agreement shall be in writing and shall be deemed sufficiently given when deposited in the mail, first-class postage prepaid, and addressed to the respective parties as follows:

Or to such other addresses as either party shall subsequently designate by notice given in accordance with this section.

- 11. This Agreement constitutes the entire understanding of the parties.
- 12. This Agreement shall be binding upon the successors and assigns of the parties.
- 13. The parties will make and execute all further instruments and documents required to carry out the purposes and intent of this Agreement.
- 14. This Agreement shall not be modified or otherwise amended except in writing signed by the parties.
